Dante's Progress

We are happy to report that Dante the Turkey Vulture is now on glove! We spent several weeks working with Dante to gain his trust. This meant spending several hours in his aviary with him talking and singing or just sitting with him. Slowly he started to feel comfortable with us and let us approach him and place his food at his feet. One day we decided to try to attempt to touch his feet and he let us. He just sat on the perch calmly and let us stroke his feet. This is important because the next step would be to put on his anklets and jesses which means having your hands at his feet for a few minutes. We spent a few days just putting on his anklets and jesses and removing them. Dante got into a nice routine of flying to a specific perch when approached with a glove. He would go sit in a certain spot on the perch and wait to be jessed up. The next step was to get him to step up on the glove. This took another couple of days for him to feel comfortable with us to do it. Finally we were ready to try it and Dante did great. He stepped right up

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and we took him for a walk while on glove. We went out of his aviary to a nice sunny spot in the yard. For the first few times on glove we only spent short periods of time outside. Slowly we are building up the amount of time on glove. Now when Dante comes out and we stand in the sun the first thing he will do is spread his wings to get the full effect of the sun. Our next step with Dante will be go get him used to seeing his travel box. We will start to put it in his aviary and place food into it. Once he is comfortable with it, the last step will be

to start putting him in the travel box from the glove and taking him out. Then when Dante is 100% comfortable with it, he’ll be ready to start coming out on programs as an ambassador to teach everyone about Turkey Vultures and how important they are.

While we are continuing to work with Dante, he is doing a very important job for us at Horizon Wings. He is being a foster parent to a young Black Vulture. This Black Vulture was found in someone’s barn which was probably his nest area. Once discovered by the people they didn’t want him back in the barn and he needed to go to a rehabilitation center for a few weeks. Even though Dante and this little bird are two different species, they are both vultures and in the wild they would spend time together. It’s important to get this little Black Vulture with another vulture and not just with humans so he doesn’t get habituated to people. In the wild Turkey Vultures have a great sense of smell to find carrion. Turkey Vultures don’t have the greatest eyesight though. Black Vultures have little sense of smell but have good eyesight. So in the wild you will often find the Turkey Vulture and Black Vulture together helping each other locate food.
